CRiBS team have been delivering RE lessons in 6 primary schools since the beginning of June. A new syllabus has been introduced this year and we are adapting to include new lessons and workshops to meet the new requirements. We will continue to be flexible to enable us to work in schools who do not adopt it. Our new RE delivery package will go under the new banner of 'REconnect' and start in September. To date 7 schools have booked for lessons for school year 21/22; of those, 3 will be using the new Bexley Agreed Syllabus, 3 have specifically asked for our current lessons, and one will be using lessons we have developed to support the 'Understanding Christianity' syllabus used by a number of CofE schools.

The team have also been busy delivering our 'Moving Up' primary to



secondary transition workshops in recent weeks. This has been well received and 19 schools will have been visited by the end of term.

We have continued mentoring a number of secondary schools boys and we have had a positive response from another school considering restarting with our mentors from September.

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change, and she was to follow Simon to his new place of work, working for only two weeks before lockdown, followed by 2 months at home before training began.

Simon meanwhile had begun his working life 10 minutes walk from his home, having spent all his secondary schooling doing a 1.5h travel each way. At 16, his only criteria was close to home, and within 2 weeks of leaving school, he had donned a Sainsbury's uniform and begun work in Woolwich. In all he spent 18 years with the company, 13 in Woolwich and then 5 years in Lee Green, the branch where he met Katie. He too graduated to management there, and latterly trained other managers because he was reliable and trusted, but then came the restructuring, and he was made redundant in 2017, staying on at the last minute to work nights for 8 months training new management

staff. Those 8 months were extremely difficult for continuity of family life, with both Simon and Katie working shifts, and they hardly saw each other with the overlapping shift patterns.

After Simon finished at Sainsbury's, he took a couple of months off to re-group, which turned into 5, and his only criteria for his next line of work was that it wasn't in retail. He found work after only his second ever job interview (interviews aged 16 and 35), and has a more regular work pattern now. Redundancy actually came at a really good time and he no longer has to work at weekends and has some choice in the work pattern.

When we last met up for regular workshop pre-the first Covid-19 lockdown in March 2020, Simon and Katie's work/life pattern meant that Katie had to work two Sundays a month, so wasn't always able to join us on Sunday mornings. This has all changed now, as they are both on 5 days a week

work, with 7 hours a day and core time 10.30am-2.30pm which is very much better for family life as they stagger their hours so they each do one of the school runs with Eliza and George. The weeks of home schooling were a challenge for them both working from home, as they were for so many other families - 2 hours early work followed by 5 hours home schooling for Simon while Katie worked, then swapping at 2.30 so Simon could finish his work day.

Another welcome change has been just how genuinely nice and friendly are their colleagues, and they both feel significant. It is an office and screen based job, so my finding them in Danson Park when not at work is not that surprising, but if you want to find out where they are actually working, you will have to ask them!
