Through the media we are made aware of the fact that over 40 million people globally are trapped in 'modern slavery' being trafficked and exploited into awful forced labour of all kinds.

Maybe like me you feel horrified that now in 2021 there are millions of people who are slaves after all I was taught at school that slavery has been outlawed in nearly every country years ago. I firmly believe that everyone has the right be free and that -

"Everyone trapped in modern slavery is a person with a name, a story and a dream."

I was shocked to find out some of the statistics and ways that we in the UK are ignorant of our often negligent participation in fuelling the often violent 'modern slavery'.

"90% of forced labour takes place in the private economy—homes, businesses, and global supply chains.

77% of UK businesses believe there is a likelihood of slavery at some stage in their supply chain, which includes some of our most-used items like coffee, electronics, and clothing." (Check websites to see if the high street or online retailer/supplier is ethical.)

This definitely didn't sit well with me as a human being and as a Christian, so I sought to find out what I could do to help stop slavery by praying to God for his guidance and wisdom.

Isaiah 1:17

Learn to do good: seek justice, correct oppression; bring justice to the fatherless, plead the widow's cause.

I was directed to an amazing organisation and signed up to receive free information and regular updates via email.

"IJM is the largest international anti-slavery organisation in the world."

It was founded in 1997 as a faith-based non-profit by American lawyer Gary Haugen of the United States. Watch his Ted Talk – "The hidden reason for poverty the world needs to address now".

"We work with local law enforcement to find and free people in slavery".

"We will not stop until all are free".

"We've seen slavery reduced by 86% in the communities that we've worked in."

IJM do incredible and dangerous work to achieve these feats and regularly report on the website the encouraging news of success stories which make me cry tears of joy for those who have been freed, supported and often then show selfless bravery to help others still enslaved.

Rukungiri

'Life in Uganda has not been easy for the past 22 months. Schools are still closed despite some of the children going back for a short while. Food ran out, there was no vaccine available and no oxygen in the hospitals (some of which had been stolen and sold on the black market). During that time, the trustees were mindful that without the teachers being paid, there is no



support for them and almost all are supporting extended families who are orphans. The school building needs to be maintained, children and families still need to be fed and there was some emergency work that needed to be carried out to the playground. The situation became quite serious and has not really improved very much. However we have managed to get some food parcels out to the children and their families.

Sadly, we have not been able to visit this year.

Some of the restrictions have been lifted but school is still not open. There is a curfew for all citizens including children from 7pm. The current thinking is that schools will remain closed until health workers, security

personnel, teachers and those over 45 are vaccinated. There was speculation that they would wait until there was sufficient vaccination of children aged 12 - 18, some of which are in primary school. If that happens, they could be closed for a very long time. We will continue to provide them with food parcels in the meantime.

Please continue to pray for them. And please pray for sponsors to come forward to replace those who unfortunately



have had to give up for various reasons. There are currently 127 children awaiting sponsorship and sadly this will increase when they do go back due to unemployment etc.

On a positive note, when they did manage to get to school for a while, the P7 children did very well in their leavers exams with 62 students in Division 1 and 9 students in Division 2, an absolutely excellent performance despite their circumstances. They remain positive and still praise God for everything!

The Life Service

Since its launch on May 9th this year, The Life Service has been a huge privilege to be a part of.

On returning to the church a year ago, Adam and Kate shared their vision with my husband Charles and I, of St. John's starting a 4pm service. Our brief was to build a team and create a new modern style service where those who had become disconnected, could reconnect and for it to be at 4pm.

The leadership team includes: Myself, Sue & Steve Read (lead, pray and speak), Charles (refreshments & lead), Linzi (kids resources), Natasha (Welcome) Rich & Christina McGill (worship). We also have a great team who make the service possible!

The Life Service is Sunday 4-5pm, except the first Sunday of each month.

The service is aimed at adults, however it is accessible for those that have children due to our Kidzone. This includes fun activity and colouring sheets, books and stickers. The



children take these to their seats. The church is set up with cafe style seating. This is groups of chairs sat

around small tables.

We also have a prayer space which includes a different interactive prayer station each week. Last but not least, are our delicious refreshments! All of these are open before, during and after the service.

Our first teaching series focussed on building a healthy church family such as praying for one another. Our second looked at important issues such as mental health. This Sunday we start our third series which focuses on purpose.

We would really appreciate your prayers for more people to join every area of the team so that we can create a rota system and for the congregation to keep growing.

Our aim is to build a community that becomes family, by "loving Jesus, loving each other and growing together".

Everyone is welcome and we would love the opportunity to welcome you!

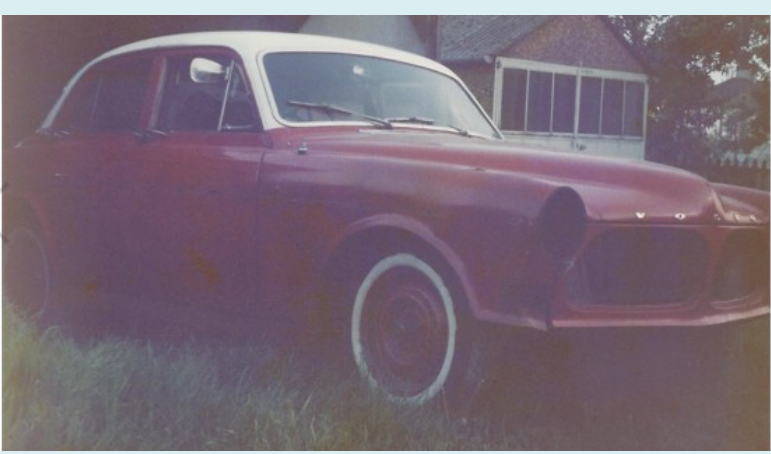
