International Justice Mission

They have helped free tens of thousands and convict thousands of perpetrators. There are lots of happy success stories on the IJM.UK website.

IJM (International Justice Mission), is a global organisation that protects people in poverty from human trafficking, modern-day slavery, violence and police abuse of power. I must stress that this is not the same as people smuggling which is helping people into other countries for a fee. IJM helps people who have been tricked, forced or taken into a life of modern day slavery in its truest and cruellest meaning. They are usually not paid, not given a place to sleep, fed scraps, work very long hours in very dangerous work and suffer mental and physical abuse daily at the hands of their captors. They are prisoners with no escape, property to be sold and bought.

IJM's mission is to protect people in poverty from violence by rescuing victims, bringing criminals to justice, restoring survivors to safety and strength, and helping local law

enforcement build a safe future that lasts.

There are over 50 million men, women and children affected by modern day slavery.

IJM staff are dedicated to saving enslaved people around the world, despite rescue missions requiring lots of meticulous planning and the high risks involved. Bringing criminals to justice often takes years and some staff and defendants have been murdered.



BUT IJM NEEDS OUR HELP – it requires lots and lots of prayer for God's help with all they do. We have an important part to play with our earnest prayers.

They would also appreciate any monetary gifts to help fund their work. There are various suggestions on the website of how we can help no matter how small. Maybe you could take part in their organised fundraising like the bike rides or talk to me if you want to fund raise in our church.

Ring for the King

A few months ago, I saw details in the media of [Ring for the King](#), a quest to find enough bell-ringers to ring every set of church bells in the UK for the King's Coronation. New young bellringers were particularly sought, to increase the number and lower the average age of campanologists (bell ringers).



I thought through the young people we have in Dubsters and 3dub, and whether any of them might be interested. It's a group activity in a safe environment and something completely different to belong to, and I thought of James Wood, who is part of Dubsters and came from Bishop Ridley Church. As you probably know, we do joint youth work with both Bishop Ridley and St Peter's, with members from at least one other church in our groups at present.

My first enquiry was to St John's Church, Erith where we already know the team, and although they didn't have the resources to train anyone, they pointed me to the other Churches in Bexley who might. On contacting St John's Church, Sidcup, I found that they weren't only recruiting but were clued up to train people and had a trial morning coming

up, so I asked James if he might be interested and talked to his parents. He was interested, and Kirstie (mum) took him to the try-out morning and he started training. He has loved it! And what's more, there was just enough time for him to get trained up to Ring for the King on the morning of the Coronation (3 hours), which he really enjoyed.

There are 38,000 bells across the UK, but when the recruitment drive began last October, there were only 30,000 ringers. By 18th May, 1500 potential recruits had come forward to fill the 8,000 vacancies. It takes 15-20 hours to learn how to handle a bell properly before joining the group ringing. 9 years old is not too young to start, and like some other areas of Church life, it's an all-age activity where children, young



people and adults can join in together. If you know someone who might be interested, I can now point them in the right direction as there are at 8 Churches with sets of bells in Bexley or immediately around Bexley, or visit <https://kcacr.org.uk/lewisham-district/towers/>.

My Faith Journey: Cathy Claridge

Shortly after moving to Thamesmead in 1983, a London City Mission outreach worker called Geoff knocked on her door, and at the time, before she and he talked, she thought she was already a Christian because she thought she was a good person. After that encounter, Geoff knocked on her door every couple of days, but Cathy didn't answer the door and avoided Geoff. Eventually she did respond, and she and Geoff began a regular Bible study at her house. Cathy soon realized that was not a Christian and needed to invite Jesus into her life (be born again), and Cathy later heard that the whole of Geoff's Church, Emmanuel Church in Thamesmead, had been praying for her to respond and thereby begin to find Christ. Geoff even knew Cathy's old Sunday school teacher from Hackney who had taught Cathy twenty years earlier and they met up for



tea at Geoff's house. In June 1983 Cathy started to attend Emmanuel Church regularly.

In 1984 on her daughter's first birthday, Cathy was baptised, and shortly afterwards she was filled with the Holy Spirit. Cathy would invite young mums to her home on a Thursday afternoon for coffee and for the children to play. This soon grew, the group of mums approached the Church to see if they could meet there, and Lighthouse Parent and Toddler group was formed which ran for 25 years.

In 1987, Cathy's husband left her, and she was left on her own with two daughters. Cathy continued to study the Bible with Geoff until 1989 but needed to take up full time employment to make ends meet. Cathy gave up going to church and at the end of 1991 found out she was pregnant with no partner, and nowhere to go, but back to Emmanuel Church, where she was welcomed with open arms. After Sophie her baby was born in April 1992 Cathy volunteered her time at the Church, and then that became her paid role as Church administrator and an active member of the church.

Through the Holy Spirit's prompting in 2012, Cathy became a Street Pastor, and trained as a bereavement counsellor and looked for ways to serve God in her community.

In 2020 Cathy was experiencing a difficult time at Emmanuel Church, and a change of Minister there made her begin to look for a new Church. In 2021, when she felt called by God through the Holy Spirit, to apply for her present role, she subsequently began to worship at St John's, Welling.

Cathy feels her faith journey has not been dramatic, just a natural process helped by listening to the Holy Spirit's intimations, those urges one cannot ignore.
