This Hymn has found a revival – because it says what we need to keep believing and

One of the real positives that has come from this strange season is that we have learnt to use technology in a way that pre lockdown, we knew was possible but hadn't utilised. We now know **Some** gatherings are definitely as good via zoom (see below) or at least the positives are not insignificant... and for sure, things will never be quite the same again with, as a definite, live streamed services being a vital part of Church life enabling housebound people to join in worship. It was a real privilege to be able to join her live streamed funeral and celebrate and learn so much about a lovely member of our church family. We continue to pray for John and the

family.

Many of us have been praying for **Katherine Parker (Charlie and Di Amis's daughter...** long time members of St John's) since her cancer diagnosis last July. Her courage as she underwent many chemo cycles was awe inspiring. Sadly by mid February her treatment became end of life care and although we knew this, we have all been struggling with real sadness following the news of her death on Feb 28th. Many of us met (on zoom) that evening to grieve together and pray for her family and Everyone struggling to come to terms with the news... we continue to both grieve and pray.

Graham Curd and family need our love and prayers as they mourn Graham's Mum Do-reen.

...So, let's keep close to God and increasingly to each other... We have much to look forward to in the coming months and doubtless a challenge or four.

INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE MISSION

Well, what a year 2020 was! With the pandemic we saw a massive increase in the level of violence against those in poverty - increased vulnerability to trafficking, an explosion of online sexual exploitation of children (OSEC) as western paedophiles had more time at home online and greater violence against women, trapped at home with their abusers during lockdowns. We experienced a significant increase in the need for our work at a time when funding was challenged by the economic impacts of COVID. UK lockdown hit just before our major fundraising month of the year.

- The Philippines marked our 100th conviction for OSEC.
- IJM Romania launched a new project to combat human trafficking. Their first case involved the UK.
- We saw IJM staff and survivors helping local communities by providing essential supplies and PPE kits and training.
- And God graciously provided finances through our amazing supporters and staff who found creative ways to fundraise, enabling us to exceed our income targets!

Thank you for your prayers and financial support. You have brought freedom and hope in the midst of darkness and despair.

Our 2030 Vision is to rescue millions, protect half a billion and make justice for people who are poor unstoppable. It feels impossible, like the first manned flight to the moon! But in God all things are possible.

Please pray for:

- God's protection, provision and continued breakthrough.
- Our Romania office as they work cases in conjunction with the UK.
- Our new casework office on the coast of Kenya, working child sex trafficking cases and the ongoing trial of 5 accused in the killing of our lawyer in Kenya.
- Our UK team providing input to a review of sentencing for OSEC crimes and for our Virtual Fundraising Gala in March.



And in total, there have been
57,000 PEOPLE
rescued from slavery and
violence since IJM began.

So we pressed into prayer. IJM UK started lockdown by stopping work for a whole day and praying. Subsequently, IJM generated a literal global wave of prayer by its staff, starting in Washington DC and moving across 13 different time zones, ending in Ghana. At the start of 2021 IJM UK staff again stopped for 36 hours of continuous prayer. In July 2020 our prayer supporters joined us for our first online Pray for Justice Event. This was followed by another event this last February. If you missed it check it out on [IJM UK's YouTube channel](#).

And our loving Father answered in ways we could never have imagined:

- Despite lockdowns across the world, we saw rescue after rescue, as we partnered with local authorities.
- Ghana saw 71 children rescued from slavery, 3 convictions, 24 survivors restored and 40 arrests.

My faith journey occurred over many years and was happening behind my back and against my will. I grew up with one parent who was an atheist and the other a non-practicing Christian, and I was one of six children.

My first recollection of Church was having to attend Sunday school and St Johns Church in Eltham, sitting through the boring Sunday Service with bags of smelly smoke wafting in the air. That set the scene for my relationship with God, even throughout my adult life. Then when one of my sons got cancer, my sister took her own life and my mum gave up on life within 6 months of my sister, my question was, 'how can a loving God cause so much pain?'

I worked diligently and provided a home and security for my immediate family but something was missing, but I didn't know what it was. I drank, and my behaviour caused the family pain.

Years later, my son had recovered from cancer, and all 3 children had grown up, Two of them were following God and shamefully, I was doing what I could to stop Terry from also following Christ.

Church, and someone spoke to me about God. I was doing my best not to listen, but on that occasion, it was being told that "we Christians are all broken" that still resonates with me today.

Then one Sunday morning as Terry was getting ready for Church, and I was about



to leave for work – epiphany! I attended Church for the first time! I totally enjoyed it; I felt the honesty of the Church.

Over the following months I started to think about my life's journey, I started to count my blessings. One of the first things
