Dear Friends,

I don't know about you but for me this winter seems particularly grey – Pandemic and Politics mixed with cold damp weather and you have the perfect storm for feeling down. One of the things we wrestle with as Christians is the temptation to be tossed about by the storms around us – to be dragged down by the circumstances – to take our eyes off the truth that Jesus Christ is Lord.

I used to encourage my Dad to read the Psalms as they show King David and others wrestling with troubles and enemies and doubt. Almost always they finish with a hope restored in the Living God. Dad always found it difficult to comprehend as he 'had no enemies'. Our enemies are often not people but things like depressive thoughts, or illness, or poverty. Or if they are people they are often faceless or nameless. God is still in control.



I have found particular comfort in the Psalms around no. 23 (The Lord's my Shepherd) with 24 reminding us that everything is the Lord's, 25 reminding us that God is trustworthy, 26 calling for vindication, and 27 reminding us that if we have the Lord's salvation there is nothing to fear, and if you ever feel

that God isn't listening psalm 28 put's that right!

Can I encourage you if you are going through a colourless time to read these Psalms and to put your trust in the reality of a God who loves and cares for you. 'Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning

and craftiness of people in their deceitful scheming. NIV Eph 4:14'

Starting in Genesis and ending in Revelation, we are learning all about God, his people, and His Son, Jesus, through games, videos and crafts, but more importantly through prayer and worship we are getting to know God more. We are seeing answers to prayers regularly and know that God cares about us in our day to day – nothing is too big or too small for Him.

In light of the ongoing covid epidemic, once again, our Nativity Service went online, and the children did a fantastic job at voicing all the characters in an animation. Christmas 2020 they were Emoji characters...Christmas 2021 they were Lego!

Through the scriptures, readings, skits, and music, 'Jesus Kids!' taught us the story of Jesus' birth and all that Jesus means to us; that no matter how dark our world may be, there's still a star shining bright to light our way back to Christ.

## Reflecting On What We Sing

Those who attend Zoom prayer will know that when I lead (usually on a Thursday) we typically pray through a hymn/song. I try to find something about its background and author - and reflect on what the words mean. So this short article will briefly look at three contrasting examples.


1. May the mind of Christ my Saviour (1925) – What do the words mean? May the mind of Christ my Saviour live in me from day to day, by His love and power controlling all I do and say.

The author of this six verse hymn, Kate B. Wilkinson (1859-1928), thought on what it means to have the mind of Christ Jesus (Philippians 2:5 "In your relationship with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus"). To have the mind of Christ is to have Christ with His love "controlling all I do and say" (verse 1), that people seeing me, realise "I triumph only through His power" (verse 2). Mrs. Wilkinson also includes Hebrews 12:1-2 in her hymn: "May I run the race before me...looking unto Jesus" (verse 5). It was first published in the London children's hymnbook Golden Bells in 1925.

2. Goodness of God (2018) – Why has the song been written?

All my life You have been faithful. All my life You have been so, so good. With every breath that I am able I will sing of the goodness of God.

The author Jenn Johnson (b. 1982), an American Christian worship singer, songwriter and worship pastor, shared that the song had been inspired by the process of adopting her fourth child. She had been singing impromptu into her phone while driving on a long country road about the faithfulness and kindness of God. The song was then developed from the impromptu recording. Jenn and her husband Brian hope to inspire others to adopt, after their adopted son Ryder Moses ("adopted deliverer") changed their lives.

3. Hark the Herald Angels Sing (1743/1753) – Who has been involved in its development?

This famous carol which I am sure you will have sung at some point each December, was written by Charles Wesley (1707-1788) in 1743 (with the title "A Hymn for Christmas Day"). It originally had ten (short) verses. Verses 1 and 2 were published as follows:

*Hark how all the Welkin rings "Glory to the King of Kings,  
Peace on Earth, and Mercy mild, God and Sinners reconciled!"  
Joyful all ye Nations rise, join the Triumph of the Skies;  
Universal Nature say, " Christ the Lord is born to Day!*

It was Wesley's friend and colleague George Whitefield, in 1753, who published a revised version with the more familiar opening lines. There were also further revisions over time to make the three verse carol we sing today - the famous tune associated with it, taken from a cantata by Mendelssohn, did not appear until a hundred years later in 1856.

The Lord has inspired writers and musicians over the centuries to compose hymns, songs and anthems and still does today – some with very interesting/challenging stories. I hope the above may inspire you to investigate the history and meaning behind your favourites.

# Surviving as a Christian in North Korea

In January 2022, the up to date Watch list will be released and although this was typed prior to its release I can guarantee that within the top 5 will be: North Korea, Afghanistan and Somalia.

North Korea has held the top spot for the last 20 years!

Christians in North Korea account for about 1.5% of the population, roughly 400,000 and sadly 50-70,000 of those are held in horrendous prisons or work in labour camps, assuming you aren't killed instantly.

The secret Police carry out raids and

even encourage children to tell their teachers about any sign of faith. There are stories of husbands/wives not knowing their spouse is a Christian.

## Could it get any harder?

Whilst you'd be right to think that life as a Christian couldn't get any harder, Covid-19 has made it worse. The authorities would have you believe that Covid-19 has had very little impact, sadly the people are so malnourished, they die quicker. The border to China/South Korea, where North Koreans were able to escape or obtain food on the black market is now under tighter control.

## The most dangerous place in the World to be a Christian

Although it's the most dangerous place in the World to be a Christian Open Door workers still put their life

in danger to meet believers, to provide spiritual help, vital food, shelter and training.

What can we do? Please keep praying for our Brothers and Sisters.

# Lamplighters / The Leprosy Mission

For those who don't know anything about Lamplighters, we are a group that meets every Friday evening at St John's. Children of Primary School age together with their leaders come to have fun, but also to support The Leprosy Mission with their prayers and fund raising.

Our motto is : To Light the Lamp of Love for those with Leprosy

It has been so good to get back together again after the disruption of COVID. Last November we were able to have our annual Christmas Fayre and were delighted to raise nearly £2000 on line and over £2,800 on the night. The online money has already gone to Purulia hospital in India to support Leprosy patients. Purulia hospital is our main support link through St John's. The need has been particularly great during COVID with provision of food for the patients also needed.

It was also great to be able to do a Lamplighter Nativity for the parents which was a very special start to Christmas for all of us.

During January the children have been preparing for World Leprosy Sunday on January 30th. They lead the morning service at St John's and it gives everyone a chance to find out more about where the money raised is spent.

This year The Leprosy Mission focus is on Anandaban Leprosy hospital in Nepal. It has research labs there that

are on the point of closure due to the physical state of the labs especially since the earthquake in 2005. These labs are doing amazing research with the aim of ending Leprosy for good. This could be the Breakthrough we have all been longing and hoping for and it's vital the labs are rebuilt. Some of our fund raising will also go to this urgent appeal and we look forward to hearing when the renovations are completed.



Lamplighters has been a part of St John's Church for 56 years and we are thankful for the generosity of the congregation and their support both financially and by supporting our events.



