Home for Good Safe Family Merger: Good News

Since the founding of Safe Families and Home for Good, we've consistently found ways to collaborate, and through this process we have increasingly recognised an alignment in our vision.

Together we have a vision to provide a more holistic solution, through the Church, to prevent children entering the care system through family support and then, if they do, ensuring there are enough safe and nurturing homes through fostering, adoption, and supported lodgings.

We believe that by joining together, as one organisation, we will see more churches equipped more volunteers empowered and trained, more local authorities served, more families supported, less children entering care and for those that do, well-matched homes found.

Every child needs a stable place to call home, an environment that feels safe and nurturing, and someone they can trust who will offer unconditional care and support.

Every family need people around who care and can support them, so that when challenges happen, they don't have to face them alone.

This merger will create huge opportunities for both charities. Each organisation brings unique strengths and bringing the experience and expertise of both together will help amplify these strengths even further.

There are some immediate opportunities that the merger will create. The first is being able to speak to the Church with one voice – to respond to direct feedback we have had from church leaders for greater collaboration and to bring an offer to the Church that allows for a holistic response to the needs of children and families, whether that is for an hour, a month or a lifetime.

Secondly, we have an opportunity to speak to both local government and national government with one voice. To add the voices of the 3,000+ children and their families that Safe Families supports each year to the expertise and advocacy of Home for Good.

Other areas of overlap and collaboration include our commitment to being trauma informed and equipping the Church with excellent training and resources that enable them to love well those impacted by trauma.

If you know her, you may have spotted Kathryn Giles at St John's after many years elsewhere. Kathryn grew up at St John's, baptised at 5 alongside her whole family, gave her life to Jesus at 10, and at 14, began to sense a strong call from God to mission and a secondary calling to teaching. Kathryn spent a month in Kenya with CMS to test out her calling, find out about mission and live in another culture. As she flew home, the clouds suddenly cleared over the Alps, and she sensed God saying He was calling her to somewhere with 'mountains and children'. She met her parents at the airport with the words, "It's not Africa...it's South America!"

She prepared with a teaching degree ("Father God, what now? Still mission overseas?") and five years teaching at Bedonwell Primary, and at St John's working with Dubsters and Youth Alpha Nations Christian College (ANCC) to train

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doing, Lord? Why am I not working with children?"

Kathryn visited the local CofE primary school, where she had previously led assemblies, to enquire about supply as a way to getting back into teaching. Instead the Headteacher insisted Kathryn join the staff as a full -time classroom teacher, where she stayed for the next 15 years until July 2024, eventually becoming the RE and Collective Worship Lead within the school. God kept adding to her role, making it feel more missional with the variety of languages and cultures, especially Latino and African, and becoming involved with families in an area where extreme wealth and extreme poverty co-exist. She began to realise she had been on the mission field the whole time and just hadn't recognised it!

While visiting St John's in May '23, a conversation arose between educators, including Laura Gibbs who is Deputy Head for a large Federation involving two Primary Schools over three sites in Greenwich, Woolwich and the Peninsula. An RE post was about to open up across the Federation, and Laura left her with an open invitation to contact her if she was ever looking for a move.

At the same time, unable ever to raise the deposit to buy her own home, Kathryn's Dad encouraged her to return to Welling to work and save, from home. To this end, Kathryn looked for a new teaching post in Bexley, but God closed doors on all of them. While walking to school one day in May, He spoke through a worship song *"I'll do anything for your glory."* Always having been a nomad for Jesus, the thought came: "Why don't you give Laura a call?" Laura replied within seconds and by the end of that day, Kathryn had an application form for the Koinonia Federation. At every stage the doors opened. "It was like St John's Primary School but SO much bigger." By the end of term she not only had a job as a classroom teacher but was also appointed RE & Worship Lead across the whole Federation.

Kathryn began to dismantle her life in North London over the summer break: six weeks to move house, break ties, leave church and uproot completely to a new area. In Kathryn's words, "I like new challenges and the opportunities for mission, and being 'Jesus' wherever He places me. I have learnt to follow the peace, to keep moving at Jesus' pace. I know I'm in the right job and am where I'm supposed to be."

My Faith Journey: Hannah Wood

My faith journey began in 2014/2015 when I began helping out at the church brownie unit which I now run, I enjoyed coming along to the parade services. I then started finding excuses to come back to the church, shortly after that I became friendly with Laura Webster who invited me to come along to messy church which I did and enjoyed helping out on. I began an Alpha course in September 2017 run by Billy-Jo and Dominic O Leary at Kate Finney's house, I went along feeling anxious and worried about what to expect but by the end of the evening having had a meal and chat with people I felt more relaxed.

After the alpha course finished I decided that I was ready to give my life to Jesus and was baptised by Danielle Pearson-Smith by full immersion on 1st April 2018, I then also joined Ken and Estelle Woodcocks house group on a Tuesday evening.

After being baptised I decided to join the Jesus Kids team once a month alongside Laura and continued to help with messy church and other church activities for the children including Erith deanery youth trust events.

On 2nd June 2019 I was confirmed at St Peter's church Bexleyheath alongside Jim Golding and Laura Gibbs, by this point I was fully immersed in church life helping regularly with children's groups and serving in other ways, fast forward to current day and I'm now part of the children and youth teams at church as well as serving on the PCC and on The Life Service team.

House Group: Men's Group

We continue to be a small but close group of guys who meet on Zoom most Thursday evenings. We talk about what we read in the Bible and we talk about life and about


