In many ways, this season has reminded us that the church is not built on one person, but on Christ and the shared ministry of His people.

As we wait, we continue to pray for the person God is calling to join us. But we also give thanks for what God is doing here and now. May this time shape us into a more prayerful, united, and expectant church, ready to welcome and partner with our new vicar when the time comes.

Waiting is not a holding pattern - it is preparation. May we wait with hope and expectation and not impatience!

I was asked why we would choose to exclude women. I think the women who go to the ladies' breakfasts would agree that it's good for men to hang out together sometimes and talk about whatever we talk about in the same way (but different, if you see what I mean) that women get value out of hanging out together sometimes and talking about whatever they talk about. There are plenty of other occasions when we can all mix with each other as we should.



It's also a good opportunity for new men to get to know the church guys and also for a few friends who don't believe to hang out with friends whose common bond is Jesus.

My Faith Journey: Pat Thomas

From an early age, my sister and I were sent to Sunday School, my parents didn't go to Church, but going to Sunday School was what children did in the 50s.

At School we had Christian Assemblies, and I loved singing the Hymns, I liked the words which made me think of a 'Father God' up there watching over us. And Jesus who loved children and was being kind.

When we were very young, my dad contracted TB and was sent away to recover in a sanitarium. He came home when I was about three, but we had to 'behave' and be guiet to allow Dad to rest.



As I grew up, I gradually developed a relationship with God, talking to Him when I went to bed, about my worries and fears.

In the 70s, I met Trevor, and we got married and came to live in Welling. Three years later we had our first child, Angela, who at six weeks was rushed to hospital with hydrocephalus. I found myself praying again for her recovery, but also asking 'why her?' She had a successful operation, but I forgot to thank God.

Angela was baptized at St John's, and then our son Andrew was born. Both children eventually went to St John's playgroup. run then by Doreen Pride, who persuaded me to bring the children to Sunday School, which I did.

Gradually, God was drawing us to Himself through St John's family. When the children went to Danson Primary School I became friendly with a number of mums who came to St John's and I was persuaded to do a 'Basics' course. I so enjoyed the course, reading the Bible and discussing all sorts of things, then Wow the Holy Spirit filled me.

There was no going back, I gave my life to Christ.

I was confirmed in 1986. I think my sister thought I'd lost them plot, but amazingly she came to faith at 65, and had a full immersion baptism.

Of course, my main desire was to bring Trevor to faith, but that's another story.

What I have learned through my faith journey is never give up praying, and to trust in the Lord with all your heart.




ately afterwards within St John the Evangelist Church, Welling, is best summarized in some of the words used within it.

Outside we prayed:

Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends if you do as I command you (John 15 13 - 14).

Today we gather together to remember before God and commend to His sure keeping those who have died for their country in time of war, those whom we knew; and whose memory we treasure, and





all who have died in the service of mankind and we now lay our wreaths in their memory.

laid first followed by those from members of our uniformed groups. Inside we prayed:

We have come together this morning as part of the family of God to thank Him for the deliverance of our nation in time of war and danger, to remember with gratitude the courage and devotion of those who laid down their lives; to commend to God's care those who are suffering as the result of war, to pray for peace and justice in the world, and to renew our dedication to Him whose service is perfect freedom.

So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will Strengthen you and help you;

I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.

The LORD himself goes before you and will be with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged.

Deuteronomy 31:8

I am holding you by your right hand—I, the Lord your God-and I say to you, Don't be afraid; I am here to help you. Isaiah 41:13
