The Welling War Memorial – A Short History

The War Memorial was originally located outside the old tin church near the site of Welling Library but was moved in the early 1930s to its current home, in the grounds of St John the Evangelist Church, Danson Lane, Welling.

An additional plinth was added (date unknown) to record the names of those lost in the second world war.

The Memorial has been moved twice within the church grounds - firstly in the 1950s when the current vicarage was built and secondly, to its current position, in late the1970s when the Jubilee Hall was built.

The memorial was unveiled on Sunday 20th March 1921 by General Edmund Phipps-Hornby. WELLING WAR MEMORIAL.

Current Conflicts

From the 2024 Annual Report compiled every June

Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan, Ethiopia, Afghanistan, Syria, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Colombia... and so on. There are up to 56 active conflicts in the world, the highest number since World War II. Moreover, these carry an increasingly international component, with 92 countries involved in wars outside their borders.

These are data from the latest Global Peace Index produced annually by the Institute for Economics & Peace (IEP), a think tank that analyses everything from military investment and the cost of violence to military laws and deaths in combat in 163 states and territories. "Getting the information is a challenge, but it allows us to compare dynamics. And what we see is a deterioration of peace over the last decade, especially in the last five years," says Michael Collins, executive director of IEP.

Conflicts have reached highest peak globally since World War II

The following military occupations constitute the majority of armed conflicts that are taking place in Europe.

Four out of seven conflicts: Russia is currently occupying

¹ Crimea (Ukraine), ² Transdniestria (Moldova), as well as ³ South Ossetia and ⁴ Abkhazia (Georgia),

while Armenia is occupying parts of ⁵ Nagorno Karabakh (Azerbaijan).

Europe is also the theatre of an international armed conflict (IAC) between ⁶ Ukraine and Russia, and of two non-international armed conflicts (NIACs) in ⁷ Ukraine opposing governmental forces with the self-proclaimed 'People's Republics' of Donetsk and Luhansk in eastern Ukraine.

'Russia's invasion of Ukraine did not change our classification of the armed conflicts in the region. Indeed, according to International Humanitarian Law (IHL) criteria, there have been an IAC between Russia and Ukraine and two NIACs in Ukraine since 2014. What has changed, since February 2022, is the intensity of the violence and its impact on the civilian population. This means, according to our analysis, that war crimes could already have taken place before March 2022' explains Dr Chiara Redealli.
